Sahitya Akademi Awards 2018 **AWARDS PRESENTATION CEREMONY**

The Sahitya Akademi Award for 2018 were presented to 24 writers at a glittering ceremony on 29 January 2019, at Kamani Auditoirum in New Delhi.

The ceremony began with an invocation song. Dr. K. Sreenivasararao, Secretary, Sahitya Akademi, welcomed Prof. Manoj Das, the chief guest Mr. Santhan Ayathurai, eminent Sri Lankan writer and Premchand Fellowship Awardee, the President and Vice President of Sahitya Akademi, Award winners and the audience. Concluding his speech Dr. Sreenivasarao thanked the Indian writers' community for their continued patronage and support through 65 years of the Akademi. Prof. Manoj Das, eminent Odia writer and Fellow of Sahitya Akademi, said that Sahitya Akademi is the pride of littereteurs and literatures. He was of the view that no geographical world has a spectacular scene as is seen today—24 writers writing in different Indian languages sitting on the same stage. He said that creative writing is a gift that needs to be treasured.

ALL INDIA TRIBAL WOMEN WRITERS' MEET

Today was the second day of Tribal Women Writers' Meet in which three sessions were conducted. The first session was chaired by K. Vasamallii (Toda) and the speakers were B.T. Lalitha Naik (Banjara), Mangla Garwal (Bhili) and Sudha Chauhan (Chaudhri). Sudha Chauhan representing the Chaudhri language highlighted that it was due to the influence of Gandhian age which created awareness among the Chaudhri community to write the intangible literary heritage. Mangla Garwal in her paper expressed in detail about the influence of Bhili literature on the life of Bhili people. B.T. Lalitha Naik said that the Banjara literature was influenced by the great epics. Chairperson K. Vasamallii said that Tribal culture is the footprint of the Indian culture. Tribals and their divine lands are inseparable, without their land there is no tribal literature.

The second session of the Meet was on Tribal Literature: Challenges and Solutions. The session began with Neetisha Xalxo (Limbu) reading her paper. She started by singing a beautiful regional song depicting the oral traditions. The second speaker was Shakuntala Tarar (Chhattisgarhi). She said that the Adivasis are so rich in culture that they have a song for each and every occasion. Sahitya Akademi Bhasha Samman awardee for Kokborok language, Sri Chandrakanta Murasingh, also shared his thoughts on this occassion. He requested all to respect their language and use it well, as when we respect our language and culture only then we will be able to face the challenges which come along with it. Chairperson, Sova Limboo Yolma (Limbu) said that in Sikkim the Adivasi language Limbo has been included in schools and colleges through which they have



given the kids a platform to learn it as an optional language, thereby giving an opportunity for the language to grow.

The third session was chaired by Satarupa Datta Majumdar Saha (Lepcha) who shared her experience of working on the languages of tribal communities of the Northeast. She laid her emphasis on the situation of language maintenance and shift, which is leading towards the language endangerment of the Koch community of the North East. Rashmi Choudhury (Bodo), K. Anjali Belagal (Bagri), Anuradha Mundu (Ho), Athira RC (Kanikkar), Archana Das T. (Kurichya), Anna Madhuri Tirkey (Kurux), Vishwasi Ekka (Kurux), Priska Kujur (Kurux - Oram), Indumati Lamani (Lamani - Banjara), Abi Maya Thapa Manger (Manger), Krairi Mog Choudhury (Mog), Heera Meena (Rajasthani), Shakuntala Besra (Santali) and Nagrekha Gaonkar (Tulu) recited their poems.
