angal Singh Hazowary, an educationist, social activist, writer was born on 2 March, 1954 at village Silbari under Bijni Police station of then Goalpara district, now Chirang of Assam, India in a middle class family. He passed Matriculation in 1970 and completed PhD on the topic "Traditional Bodo Festival: A Critical study" in 1999 from the Gauhati University. He is the first ever Sahitya Akademi award winner (2005) in Bodo, after the inclusion of the Bodo language in the eighth schedule of Constitution of India for his book of poems Jiuni Mwghang Bisombi Arw Aroj which reflects the spiritual side of life, embedded in the original religious teachings in the Bodo society, and it exhorts the readers to eschew violence. It also recorded the rites, rituals and other culture-specific areas of Bodo-life. The work is considered as an exceptionally rich contribution of Indian poetry in the Bodo language. He has many valuable works in the Bodo and other languages.

After receiving the Sahitya Akademi award he said in an interview: "I remember writing poems and short articles when I was in class VII. It has been a long odyssey ever since. As I grow up I continued writing poems and short stories and play. Gradually literature became an essential part

of my life". He further commented, "My poetry, essentially reflects my feelings and experiences in life. It is quite personal. My first poetry collection Jiuni Khonthai Methai (Jiban Sangeet) reflects my poetic style and aesthetic expressions. My plays centre around the historical characters like Sambindhan Kachari, Jolia Dewan, Jwhelao Dwimaleu -- people who had asserted their will and voice. It is not that these historical plays are bereft of any social content. I try to give a glimpse of the social conditions through language, characters and plot of both modern and earlier times. I try to focus on the contemporary issues in Bodo society and also to give a message to the next generation. I think writers and intellectuals have a great responsibility in sustaining the peace that has now transpired. They have to play a constructive role in creating proper environment and good feelings among the people and enlighten the mass through their works. Bodo literature has come a long way but I believe that the best is yet to come. I believe that modern literature has taken shape from folk literature. The roots of Bodo literature is also in its folk form."

Hazowary has published his collection of critical essays and reviews entitled Raithai Arw Sansri, 2002 (Essays and Thought). This collection contains critical essays on Rupnath Brahma and his poetry, Satish Chandra Basumatary and his poetry, "Sijou Garemsa" of Samar Barhma Choudhury, Rupnath Brahma, the essayist, literary efflorescence of the Bibar era and so on. Many essays included in this collection deal with social issues, religion, education and culture. Interestingly the author has included critical

essays on Robert Browning, Shelley and Keats.

Hazowary, a playwright of the modern period has contributed many social and historical plays to Bodo dramatic literature. In 1984. he published his first historical play Swmdwn (Sambudhon, the hero), where Hazowary has presented the heroic deeds of Sambudhon, who fought against the British and sacrificed his life. Through Sambudhon, the playwright has presented the sheer patriotism and nationalism that inspire the common men in our country. The drama became alive and appealing because of the short, witty dialogue, sparkling scenes and the fusion of historical and imaginative characters and action in the play. Two more historical plays have come out from his pen. These are Jwhwlao Daimalu and Jaolia Dewan.

Hazowary started his career as a Teacher of primary education at Silbari J.P. School from 1971 to 1978. In the year 1978 he served as the Teacher of secondary education at Boro Bazar H.E. School as Assistant Teacher up to 2

July 1984. He joined as a Lecturer of Teacher Training College at Govt. College of Teacher Education, Kokrajhar on 5 July 1984 and subsequently he was appointed as the Principal of the Govt. College of Teacher Education, Kokrajhar and rendered his service to that post from 19 February 2000 till his retirement on 31 March 2015.

In addition to his serving as the Lecturer of Govt. College of Teacher Education, Kokrajhar, he was deputed as the part timer lecturer of the Gauhati University, Guwahati, Commerce College, Kokrajhar, Girls' College, Kokrajhar and Gauhati University, Kokrajhar campus.

He held key positions in various national institutions, organizations and public organizations as follow:
